Which hand sanitizers can I use for COVID-19?



Increased demand for hand sanitizer means that it can be difficult to find the right kind – especially because not all hand sanitizer is effective!

HEALTH CARE SETTINGS:

Health Canada and the BC Centre for Disease Control recommend alcohol-based hand sanitizers for use in health care settings (70-90 per cent alcohol concentration).

NON-HEALTH CARE SETTINGS:

Health Canada has a list of approved hand sanitizers for sale in Canada and recommended for use by the general public.
