Child and Family Services: Where are we now?

- The time for change is now.
 - The Truth and Reconciliation Commission's Calls to Action
 - The Canadian Human Rights Tribunal Decision
 - Grand Chief Ed John Report's 85 recommendations
 - The recent reports from British Columbia's Representative of Children and Youth
- Canada is committed to reform the First Nations Child and Family Services Program
- Reforms should be based on shared outcomes- child and family well-being in First Nations communities



What have we done so far?

- **Budget 2016 Investments**
 - Budget 2016 Investments for the First Nations Child and Family Services Program
 - \$635M in new funding over five years (nationally)
 - For BC, this includes \$51.2M in new funding for operations and prevention for the Delegated Aboriginal Agencies
 - \$100K per Delegated Aboriginal Agency last year to identify their distinct needs and develop culturally-relevant programs
 - \$382M for Jordan's Principle over three years (nationally)

 - Ongoing Regional Partnership Tables
 - Delegated Aboriginal Agencies and MCFD





Engagement Principles: Partnership with the First Nations Health Council

- INAC and FNHC Memorandum of Understanding
 - Further engagement directly with BC First Nations
- Principled Goals in MoU:
 - Community-Driven, Nation-Based
 - Increased First Nations Decision-Making
 - Improve Services
 - Foster Meaningful Collaboration and Partnership
 - Develop Human and Economic Capacity
 - Be Without Prejudice to First Nations Interests
 - Function at a High Operational Standard



What we have heard so far The things we need to change:

- Significantly decrease the number of children in care and prevent children from going into care
- Work to achieve family reunification and preservation
- Improve child, family and community well-being
- Work with First Nations and the Province to develop funding models that work
- Provide more help for families in the court system
- Consider new approaches to jurisdiction in the area of child welfare.



What we have heard so far What works:

- Promising practices in Child Welfare have been emerging in British Columbia:
 - Sts'ailes Project (a model of co-location)
 - Wet'suwet'en: Anuk Nu'At'en Ba'glgh' iyi z'ilhdic (ANABIP)
 - Stikine Wholistic Working Group
 - Conferences/sharing opportunities
