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- no increases 2003 to 2010,
 (12.5% inflation decrease) when budget was increased by about 20% and # of sites by 50%; in 2013 same: 20% more sites, 16% more \$
- 2006-2016 funding decreased by 15% (on top of an inflation decrease of 18% in that period)
- 2010 to 2015 FNICCI BC allocation decreased by 6% (with a further 8.5% decrease on account of inflation)




